New Year's Resolutions

As we jump into 2017, many of us have come up with a New Year's resolution. These usually revolve around improving ourselves in some form or fashion. These might include the goal of losing 20 pounds or maybe to be give up a bad habit. In any case, the New Year signifies to many a chance at a new beginning. Here at school we are also looking to create some resolutions. I have highlighted two resolutions I think everyone needs to have in regards to education.

The first resolution that every student should have is to increase their attendance. It is evident that poor attendance causes several issues for students. When a student is absent it creates issues that are detrimental to the learning of the student. First of all, the student misses out on personal instruction. This instruction is crucial, especially when new material is being covered. It is difficult to comprehend new material when you are unable to ask the teacher personally. Secondly, being absent puts the student behind in day to day work. As the old saying goes "the show must go on" is true in education. The curriculum of a school has a design to move daily. When a student is gone the curriculum does not stop for them. Getting caught up is something that many kids struggle with once they fall behind. Lastly, poor attendance has some ugly predictions which can stay with a student for a long time. One of these predictions that come from poor attendance is the drop-out concept. A 2004 article written by Jennifer Railsback states that if a student has an attendance problem they are 66% more likely to drop-out of school. In this same article it is stated that students with attendance issues are 52% more likely to be detained by law-enforcement by the age of 25. I think we can all agree that these outcomes are not what we want to see for any of our students.

The second resolution I believe all students should work towards is to accept responsibility. Every day we all have multiple responsibilities. It is extremely important we accept these responsibilities. Just like any job or chore, issues arise in education when a particular responsibility is not accepted. In education there are three entities involved- parents, students, and school personnel. All three have different but important responsibilities. I would argue that the primary responsibility falls on the student. A student is ultimately responsible for their successes and their failures. The sooner they realize this, the better off they will be. As for the parents, their job is to support and guide the student at home. A lot of the student's attitude and feelings about school comes from the parent. If the parent builds up the school to their children, the school is viewed as a positive place. If the parent tears down the school to their children, students will view the school as a negative place. Parents obviously have an enormous influence over their children. The third member of this responsibility team is school personnel. It is the responsibility of the school personnel to give each student the opportunity to learn. School personnel spend countless hours trying to create these opportunities. Schools are far from perfect but it is something we work on every day. If any of these three entities do not accept their responsibility, it often rolls back onto the other two parties to make up for it causing additional stress or frustration. If we all can become more active in our responsibilities, we can help our students gain academic success.

I sincerely hope that together we can make our students' academic dreams become a reality. Let's make 2017 the best year yet.

After bounding from desktop to desktop he hops to the front of the room and smashes a red button on the wall initiating what I can only describe as a NASA launch sequence, complete with sirens, lights, and smoke. Not your typical 5th grade math class.

This past month, along with several high school teachers, I had the privilege of attending a two day training at the Ron Clark Academy. During this training, we had the opportunity to watch two national teachers of the year work with their staff to educate the one hundred and twenty middle school students enrolled in their school. Each day was filled with observations of live teaching followed by sessions where we could question these teachers and learn more about the why of what they do.

One major observation I had is that they infuse teaching into everything they do and all of these unique strategies, no matter how crazy they may seem, have a specific purpose. As I was going from class to class a few days after we had returned, I had several students ask, “Mr. Weddle what kind of training did our teachers go to because they are acting a little....weird.” I even had a few students ask if they could go along if we go again.

I would have to say that as I observe classrooms, I do see a new sense of energy and excitement. For some, I am sure that these changes may be a little uncomfortable as it places them out of their box. So if you hear about an Alcatraz theme in Mrs. Mahannah’s room or hear “My teacher wants me to stand and address the class when I answer questions,” they are absolutely correct. Typically you go to a conference hoping to pull one or two positive ideas. From this conference you have to be a little careful of not implementing all the ideas you have at once....great problem to have!
